

The Aspirations Project

The aspirations project aims to complement the education of selected pupils at the schools in the Wimbledon partnership by encouraging them to think positively about themselves and their academic careers and by giving them extra-curricular experiences of lasting value. The project has been designed by King's College School with the support of Coombe Boys' and Girls' Schools, Ricards Lodge, The Ursuline, Grey Court and Raynes Park High Schools and St Mark's Academy.

How the project works

Every year each school selects a group of about ten students who they think would benefit. A teacher at the school liaises with them and their parents to give them information and the dates and times of the sessions, which usually take place twice a term. Before each session the teacher meets the students to discuss a special workbook which prepares them by encouraging them to think about each session in advance.




In Years 9 and 10 students attend once or twice-termly sessions designed to broaden their intellectual horizons and encourage them to aim high at school and beyond. The sessions include workshops in science and arts subjects, a debate and a visit to the National Theatre. Students also attend a scientific lecture, a creative writing workshop and the Palace of Westminster. In Year 11, students visit the University of Sussex, where they are invited to sign up for the university's



Special Access Scheme. In the spring term they are expected to attend weekly GSCE revision classes at King's after school. After their exams some may get the opportunity to gain work experience by acting as student leaders in an arts and sports scheme run on the King's site for three primary schools. In Year 12 they are invited to attend academic society meetings and extension classes at King's. The final session of the project is a preparing for university day designed to give

them information and help with applying to university. Students in the project are welcome to attend the Y12 sessions even if they are no longer attending one of the schools in the Wimbledon Partnership.

Parents are asked to make sure that their sons and daughters attend every session so that they can get the most they can out of the project. Throughout the project, students are encouraged to mix with the students from other schools. They are expected to be responsive, curious, open-minded and willing to learn.





Outreach

The aspirations project is not the only way in which King's College School works in partnership with the local community. Its work with the Coombe Schools includes shared management courses and joint teacher-training arrangements. Two members of staff are governors at schools in the Wimbledon partnership and large numbers of YII students from the partner schools attend once-weekly GCSE extension classes in the spring term every year. In 2016-17 Gifted and talented students in Y8 are attending an inspirational science course taught by members of our sixth form. The school's programme of Friday afternoon activities includes the teaching of Latin, Maths, Science, Chinese and English as an Additional Language to students at schools in the partnership, and a wide range of joint creative projects involving

drama and music. King's hosts an annual showcase for creative projects with secondary and primary schools in its school theatre at the end of the spring term, and invites children from St Mark's, Southmead and Ronald Ross Primary Schools on to its site for an arts and sports scheme known as the Open Doors project every summer. Altogether over 360 King's students do some form of community project every Friday afternoon in term time, including work in secondary, special needs and primary schools, libraries, a local park, and hosting a tea for the elderly in the school canteen, while the school also runs a junior aspirations project for pupils in Years 5 & 6 at five primary schools.
